We have several others wanting to run for office as well – more to follow there.



To create a strong, successful party in New Mexico, LPNM needs money. It's as simple as that. Fundraising is every member's responsibility. But don't worry: I'm here to help you.

The first step in creating a successful fundraising campaign is compiling a list of potential donors. Toward that end, I'll be creating a couple of forms you can use to help identify prospective party members or donors. Remember: fundraising is not a dirty word! 
Day 10: Adopt a Right to Work Law

If labor unions were like any other private club or organization, an individual could choose whether or not to pay dues and become a member. Unfortunately, unions have been granted government protections over the years that have allowed them to dominate certain industries.

Simply put, "Right to Work" laws prohibit employers and unions from requiring membership in a union or payment of union dues as a condition of employment.

According to economist Dr. Richard Vedder, both population and income growth have been significantly faster in the 22 states with right-to-work laws than in those states that allow forced unionism. Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona and Utah all have right to work laws in place. Indiana became the latest state in the nation to adopt such a law. A recent Rio Grande Foundation paper found that New Mexico would have New Mexico's employment in 2011 would have been approximately 21 percent higher had a Right to Work law been enacted in 1980.¹



If New Mexico's political establishment wants to stand up to special interests and create jobs, there are few policy prescriptions with better track records of success than passage of a "Right to Work" law.

Day 16: End Liquor License Larceny

According to the *Santa Fe Reporter*:

Currently, there are a set number of liquor licenses available in New Mexico, based on the principle of one license per 2,000 people. That restriction dates back to post-Prohibition times. Beer and wine licenses for restaurants are separate, and there are different prices for bars than for retailers selling packaged alcohol.

Because of the limited number of licenses, they commonly go for \$500,000 a pop or more – a prohibitively large sum for would-be new business owners.¹

The article goes on to note that:

According to the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission website, a two-year packaged liquor retailer in Texas pays \$1,500. By contrast, a recent packaged liquor license sold in New Mexico cost \$750,000, according to the New Mexico Alcohol and Gaming Division. Retailers and bars pass that price on to consumers.²

All New Mexicans understand that the state has had and continues to have serious problems with alcoholism and drunk driving. On the other hand, our current licensing laws are extremely arbitrary and are not designed to address the real issue of problem drinking.

The current environment creates artificial scarcity and limits the ability of those of modest means to involve themselves in the business of serving liquor. In other words, it creates a cartel run by those who can afford to invest outrageous sums in liquor licenses. Current law, therefore, penalizes small businesspeople and their potential employees.


Rather than limiting liquor licenses based on an arbitrary population number in a way that has caused tremendous price inflation, New Mexico legislators should consider regulatory changes designed so the number of licenses enables their price to reach a market price similar to that of one or more surrounding states.

Libertarian Party doubling in size before our eyes

It was only one month ago, just one month after the election, that the Libertarian Party announced its ambitious goal to run double the number of candidates in 2013 and 2014 than it did in 2012. As detailed by the Party's Executive Director this week, they're well on their way to achieving that number, and maybe more.

Candidate recruiting

Libertarian Party Executive Director Carla Howell is still smiling these days. And she has plenty of reason to. The Party tracks the number of citizens who contact the LP each year to get more information about possibly running for elective office on the Libertarian ticket. Since the November election, they've received 370 candidate inquiries. According to Howell, that's more than double the number the party received in either 2008 or 2010. Added to the hundreds of party members that are recurring candidates every election, and it creates quite a slate of potential elected officials.

Considering the Libertarian Party ran 580 candidates nationwide last year, that forecasts to over 1,100 Libertarian Party candidates on the General Election ballot in 2014, possibly more. For the record, out of those 580 Libertarian candidates in 2012, 7 received over 1 million votes each. That's not bad if you remember that the Republicans and Democrats outspent the Libertarian Party \$666 to \$1 in the last election cycle – \$2 billion to \$3 million.

Libertarian snowball effect

Another statistic that analysts might consider an 'indicator' is that in the 2012 Presidential election, the Republicans and Democrats had to spend 666-times the amount of money to receive 99-times the number of votes. One could argue that if their money were to dry up, so would the resulting votes. In the Libertarian Party, money is less of a necessity and more of a benefit.

While the two establishment parties are accused of selling their political souls to obtain the massive amount of corporate and special interest funding needed to prop up their candidates each election, the Libertarians actually turn a profit on each new member. But then, it's easy to be a successful salesman when you've got a legitimate product to sell.

Speaking to new Party members, Libertarian Executive Director Howell said, "Based on past prospecting efforts, every \$51 you donate up front will bring in one new LP member. However, during the next three years, that new member donates over \$153 to the Libertarian Party – plus votes Libertarian and supports Libertarian candidates – a triple win. It's an investment that pays off for liberty."

Let this column rephrase that – If the Libertarian Party had received the \$2 billion in contributions the Dems and GOP did in 2012, they'd have a campaign chest with over \$6 billion in 2015 and 39,215,686 new Libertarian Party members – each year. And unlike the Democrats and Republicans, not one bit of it is from multinational corporations buying influence. It's all from the American people. For comparison's sake, President Obama's final vote total in the 2012 General Election was 65,899,660.



The Libertarian Party's Carla Howell says that's not all either, adding, "Plus, every 25 new Libertarian Party members generates 1 additional Libertarian candidate on the ballot during the next election cycle." Again, if the Libertarian Party had spent the \$2 billion the Democrats and Republicans did in 2012, they would have had 39 million new members, generating 1.5 million candidates in 2014.

If the Republicans and Democrats are watching, they might want to take note. While their two establishment parties continue to shrink and need to spend more and more money each year to acquire fewer and fewer votes, the Libertarian Party is functioning under the opposite paradigm. The more they grow, the bigger their voice. And the bigger their voice, the more they grow.

Musings of a Libertarian Buddhist

Recently, I was challenged by an Obama supporter friend of mine. A fellow "Buddhist" as to my views on gun control. The fact that I thought guns kept people safe from criminal and tyrannical activity apparently disqualified me from walking as did The Buddha.

This statement already illustrates the problem at hand. Coercion.

Libertarian values at their core center around the idea of non-aggression. Non-coercion. It is this idea that attracted me to the Libertarian political philosophy. Simply put, do not coerce others in any way, shape, or form. Religion, in my opinion is one of biggest forms in which people attempt to coerce people. By trade, I am a martial arts instructor. I tell my students all the time that bullying can occur physically, mentally or spiritually. I teach them to watch for signs of bullying and to never fall victim to it. Spiritual bullying can be very intense in nature. It can lead to murder, mass murder, or genocide.

That being said, what attracted me to Buddhism as a spiritual practice (read: not religion) was the idea of letting go of judgment as a way to improve the self. When you take the ideas of Siddhartha Gautama the man (The Buddha), he was very wise in leaving room for questioning his teachings. "If you find The Buddha, kill The Buddha" being one of my personal favorites, he encouraged revolutionary thought. Even if it were against his own ideas. He very carefully closed the door on any who would make a deity out of him.

Yet many did. Many do. To the point where when you mix Buddhism with modern "Democrat" beliefs, you get coercion. "You can't believe in gun rights and The Buddha's teachings at the same time." I disagree. In fact, if you look at the evidence, it would appear that Buddhism as a philosophy is more geared to Libertarian thought than other forms of spiritual practices while still leaving room for others who have different spiritual inclinations.

Example: The Buddha said, "no one saves us but ourselves. No one can and no one may. We ourselves must walk the path." Were he a statesman saying this exact line, it might come at a time just before he gets rid of entitlement programs. In fact, that single line almost excludes Democrats from his teachings, not Libertarians. He goes on to say; "The whole secret of existence is to have no fear. Never fear what will become of you. Depend on no one. Only the moment you reject all help are you freed." I can assure you, right along with my Buddhist principles, I will not be taking any handouts soon. Seems pretty downright Libertarian to me.

I am not the only one who believes the belief systems are seamlessly compatible. Robert A. Meyer calls it "The Way of the Libertarian Warrior." His writings blend his idea of the Zen Buddhist – a peaceful warrior-with hard-hitting Libertarian edge: "When Patrick Henry said 'give me liberty or give me death,' he wasn't joking. He understood an eternal truth. Government subjugation of an individual's body, mind, and spirit amount to a living death."

The man understands the biggest bully known to man: The Government, and he will not take it lightly. Not a man lacking in diligence. And what did The Buddha say about diligence? "To be idle is a short road to death and to be diligent is a way of life; foolish people are idle, wise people are diligent."

Moving on to compassion, another Buddhist principle, I will give you a peek into my martial arts classroom. I tell the children as well as adults, "self-reliance is compassion in action. Loving yourself so much that you will defend yourself is actually the highest form of love. How can you love another human or be compassionate with one if you have none for yourself? Love yourself. You deserve it." Any compassion that you are capable of giving is because you are self-reliant to have something to give. When giving of your own free will, that is true compassion. Plus, the person receiving gets to feel true gratitude. How spiritually devoid is a transaction then when coercion is involved? In fact, the spiritually inclined man in me believes that coerced giving is "evil." You promote resentment from the giver. The person on the receiving end does not feel gratitude but entitlement. And the receiving party actually resents the giver for having more. When done in freedom, there is gratitude and compassion sprung forth into the universe. The government wants us to feel that the evil is not wanting to be forced to give. Again, I will refer back to the Buddha here: "virtue is persecuted more by the wicked than it is loved by the good."

The more I study and feel from within, I know that no other political philosophy can actually make sense to my Buddhist principles other than the Libertarian party. So I am grateful to the person who questioned my positions on gun control and the Buddha. It inspired a deeper introspection that reaffirmed my already solid principles.

If you send it in a text-only format, make it clear to me if you want anything in **bold type**, underlined, *in italics*, struck-through, **different colors**, etc. I'm not telepathic here, so help me out. And **NO** Wordperfect files – I can't open those.

Graphics (pictures, cartoons, etc.) – send the highest quality graphics you can – email them to me at the address above, and I'll do what I can to get them in the next issue. In particular, what I want are pictures of YOU the LPNM members, either at LPNM-sponsored events or at other peoples' events. Submission deadline for each issue – midnight, third Tuesday of the month.
